Connect The Field

Big Idea: Dance education creates a wide range of opportunities to illuminate, embody, and express oneself as an individual and as a participant in a variety of communities. NDEO and its partners work collaboratively and collectively using dance strategies to promote a range of professional and cultural practices, transcend perceived differences, and honor the individual within the growing community of dance educators.

Goal: Develop and promote a community of individuals, organizations, and institutions who share a passion for excellence in dance education, artistry, research, and administration.



Build Knowledge

Big Idea: To carry out the work outlined in the industry standards, dance educators need easy access to a wide range of timely, useful, and accurate information that can support their efforts. NDEO and its many partners work to ensure that all dance educators, other key stakeholders, and decision makers have the knowledge and resources needed to deliver dance education in fine arts.

Goal: Build, promote, and share knowledge that impacts teaching and learning in and through dance.



Cultivate Leadership

Big Idea: Recognizing that all dance professionals are leaders in their own situations, access to resources and mentors are essential for leadership development. NDEO and its partners work to change the conversation about leadership in our field and foster a new and diverse leadership who can ensure that dance has representation among the arts.

Goal: Equip experienced and emerging professionals in the field with opportunities to develop and exhibit leadership skills.

Membership

Membership in NDEO not only helps to advance the field, but it gives you the support, programs, and networking opportunities to grow your career and benefit your students. Membership Types:

- 1. Professional Member (\$115 a year): Individuals actively working/teaching in dance or dance education: dance educators, dancers and choreographers, dance specialists in medicine/science and technology, arts educators and administrators. Also for individuals interested in supporting or promoting dance or dance education.
- 2. Ph.D. / Ed.D. Candidate Member (\$115 a year): Individuals pursuing a Ph.D / Ed.D. in any field related to dance and dance education.
- 3. Young Professional (\$85 a year): A one-year non-renewable membership for individuals who are within 3 years of graduation from a high school, community college, college (associate degrees), university (bachelor's or master's degrees), or conservatory program and who are teaching or working in the field of dance or dance education. Must provide proof of recent graduation date (i.e. a diploma or transcript) to membership@ndeo.org.
- 4. Retiree Member (\$60 a year): Individuals retired from a career in dance or dance education.
- 5. Undergraduate Student (\$50 a year): Undergraduate students pursuing associate or bachelor degrees in the dance or dance education field.
- 6. Graduate Student (\$75 a year): Graduate students pursuing master's degrees in the dance or dance education field.
- 7. Institutional Member Dance Studio (\$185 a year): Dance Studios and Academies that are primarily educational organizations; may produce recitals but are not primarily presenting organizations. Eligible for up to 2 faculty discounts on Professional Memberships.
- 8. Institutional Member K-12 Schools (\$185 a year): Public and private schools with grades Pre-K to 12th that offer dance classes to their students. Eligible for up to 2 faculty discounts on Professional Memberships.
- 9. Institutional Member Higher Education Institution (\$250 a year): Colleges and universities that offer associate. bachelor's, master's degrees, or dance minors in dance or dance education, as well as any type of conservatory program that caters to the post-high school student.
- 10. Institutional Member Performing Arts Organization (\$185 a year): Dance education departments of performing arts organizations (e.g. San Francisco Ballet, New York City Ballet, Alvin Ailey), community center organizations that offer dance programs (e.g. YMCA), and dance service organizations (e.g. DanceUSA, Dance Heritage Coalition). Eligible for up to 2 faculty discounts on Professional Membership.



HOW TO APPLY AND REGISTER FOR COURSES

**If you are already an OPDI Student, proceed to #7. You only need to apply to become an OPDI Student ONE TIME.

- 1. Log in to your NDEO Account (or OPDI Account for Institutional Members only).
- 2. Click your name at top right corner.
- 3. Select "Profile" from drop-down menu.
- 4. Go to the OPDI box under your member profile and select "click here to access the OPDI online application".
- 5. Complete all questions and press submit (\$25 application fee waived for all active members!).
- 6. Wait for application to be approved by NDEO.

DELTA is a collaborative effort by NDEO and the State Education Agency Directors of Arts Education (SEADAE) to build national consensus on baseline competencies necessary to ensure entry-level K-12 public school dance educators enter the field with the requisite Pedagogic Content Knowledge (PCK) and skills for successful entry into K-12 public school dance education. Driven by the fact that Dance is the only art form with no national entry-level teacher readiness examination, which measures pedagogic content knowledge and serves as a gateway for dance certification – NDEO & SEADAE secured funds from the National Endowment for the Arts to create and field test a praxis examination for the field. After several years of development and field-testing, DELTA is ready for inaugural launch of an operationalized examination.

What is DELTA?

DELTA is a 90-minute teacher readiness assessment, aligned to national standards, that measures the Pedagogic Content Knowledge and subject specific content knowledge in dance. The test consists of 150 selected response test items with and without stimulus materials. The intent of DELTA is to serve as one measure of allowable proof of subject-matter competency to ensure that beginning dance teachers have the requisite pedagogic content knowledge and skills for successful entry into the public schools.

The broad goals of DELTA are to empower new dance educators to:

- Understand how to communicate the content, skills, and knowledge articulated in the National Core Arts Standards (2014)
- Understand how students develop content, skills, and knowledge in dance in a developmentally appropriate manner
- Understand industry-standards for learning and teaching dance (including dance content, education theory, practice, and methodology) as set forth in the NDEO Professional Teaching Standards for Dance Arts (2005, 2011)
- Measure knowledge and skills of teachers necessary to engage students in learning dance, consistent with national standards (NDEO, 2011)
- Identify pedagogic strengths and weaknesses for future professional development of pre-service dance education programs, and recent graduates from dance education degree programs across the country (NDEO, 2011)

Dance Education Standards

NDEO has been instrumental in the writing of standards for dance education, most recently the 2014 National Core
Arts Standards in Dance. In addition, NDEO has the Professional Teaching Standards for Dance Arts (PTSDA) and the Standards for Dance in Early Childhood. Read on to discover more about these standards and determine which one is the best fit for your teaching needs.

- What your students should know and be able to do PreK-High School.

-Our artistic processes organize the standards across the arts disciplines: Creating, Performing, Responding, and Connecting. Each artistic process includes a set of overarching anchor standards. The anchor standards are consistent among the arts disciplines represented in the National Core Arts Standards and demonstrate the breadth of the work. They are held constant for student learning over time and are especially adaptable to a variety of settings, including but not limited to K-12, Private Schools, Dance Studios, After School/Outreach Programs, and much more. Within the standards, there are opportunities to integrate other disciplines into the dance lesson. The standards align with National Core Arts Standards in Music, Theatre, Visual Arts, and Media Arts, allowing for collaborative and interdisciplinary opportunities.

The Registry of Dance Educators



Currently, in the United States, there are no federal guidelines or agencies that regulate the dance education industry or that issue standardized, rigorous qualifications for dance educators. Various states, colleges, universities and private sector entities offer certifications, credentials, exit exams, and/or degrees, which differ significantly among institutions and states.

Given such inconsistencies, the mission of the NDEO's **Registry of Dance Educators** is to establish highest standards for teaching and learning dance in the United States, and to strengthen the role of the dance educator and the profession of dance in American education, culture, and life.

To this end, NDEO's Registry identifies, recognizes, and promotes highly qualified dance educators, known as master teachers, through the Registered Dance Educator (RDE) Accreditation.

What is a Master Teacher in Dance?

Master teachers in dance command the content, skills, and knowledge in the dance genre(s) they practice. They are constant learners and model best pedagogical practices in teaching and learning dance. Master teachers embed dance education in larger domains of knowledge associated with human development, dance science, one's individual well-being and life-style, and community and culture. Master teachers provide leadership at local, state, and/or national levels, and serve as a catalyst for change in the field.

What is Registered Dance Educator (RDE) Accreditation?

RDE accreditation is a rigorous performance based, peer review process created by the profession that identifies and nationally recognizes a master teacher in dance.

RDE accreditation provides evidence that:

- The teacher has a minimum of ten years of experience teaching in the field of dance
- The teacher possesses scope and depth of knowledge in dance content and pedagogy described in the *Professional Teaching Standards for Dance Arts*
- The teacher adheres to industry standards and the RDE Code of Ethics
- The teacher meets annual requirements for continuing education and professional development
- The teacher provides service and leadership at local, state, and/or national levels
- The teacher serves as a catalyst for change in the field
- The teacher maintains annual membership in NDEO to stay current in industry standards and practice

Who can apply for the RDE Accreditation?

RDE accreditation is open to all dance educators teaching in any sector of dance education: private studios, public and independent PreK-12 schools, colleges and universities, community and cultural centers, performing arts organizations, and other diverse environments. It requires ten years of teaching experience and current NDEO membership.

NDEO's Board of Directors is a working board comprised of active members and requires expertise in specific roles that are integral to NDEO leadership, infrastructure, and long-term stability. The NDEO governance consists of a Policy Board of Directors and an Advisory Board of Directors.

The **Policy Board of Directors** provides leadership and assumes responsibilities for establishing and implementing duties relevant to policy-making, financial matters, and legislative issues. The Policy Board consists of: the officers of President, Secretary, Treasurer, and either President Elect or Past President; 5 policy board members; and the Executive Director. All policy board members have voting rights. Each Policy Board member acts as a liaison to an Advisory Board position.

The **Advisory Board of Directors** provides leadership and assumes responsibilities in specific areas of expertise. Elected Advisory Directorships include: Awards; E-Communications; National Honor Society for Dance Arts; Research; Resources; Membership Engagement; State Affiliates; and 2 student liaisons (Undergraduate and Graduate). Appointed and Liaison Advisory Directorships include: Advocacy; Standards, Curriculum, and Assessment; Registry of Dance Educators (RDE); and the Editors of *Journal of Dance Education* and *Dance Education in Practice*. Each Advisory Board of Director works with a committee of volunteer members who assist in carrying out the duties of that position. Committee work provides additional opportunities to serve NDEO and the field while also providing training for future leaders.
